10 Things You Can Do To Prevent Stormwater Runoff Pollution

• Use fertilizers sparingly and sweep up driveways, sidewalks, and gutters.

• Never dump anything down drains or in streams.

- Vegetate bare spots in your yard.
- Compost your yard waste.

• Use least toxic pesticides, follow labels, and learn how to prevent pest problems.

• Direct downspouts away from paved surfaces; consider a rain garden to capture runoff.

• Take your car to the car wash instead of washing it in the driveway.

• Check your car for leaks and recycle your motor oil.

• Pick up after your pet.

Code requirements:

• Typical projects that may require approval include replacement of siding, windows, doors if there is a structural change to the project, also permits are required for porches, railings, steps, fences, signs, and most construction. Applications are available at the Village Office or Village Website

www.villageofphoenix-ny.gov. Please call before starting your project.

• Most construction projects require building permits. Contact me for specific rules for your proposed projects. I will be glad to provide any information that is needed and help you with the approval process.

• The Village Code and the Property Maintenance Code of New York State contain provisions regulating junk cars, refuse and debris, tall grass, and building maintenance such as painting. You can report any violations to me at (315) 380-6991.

• Although it is legal to do your own electrical work, the work may require a permit, and in any case requires an inspection agency. If in doubt as to your ability to safely do your own installation, call a licensed electrician.

Protect the Skin You're In!



With the hot summer season currently upon us, the Village of Phoenix is providing its residents tips on how to keep their skin safe when they are outdoors:

• Apply sunscreen with a sun protection factor (SPF) of 30 or greater 30 minutes before sun exposure and every two hours thereafter – more if you are sweating or swimming.

• Select clothing, cosmetic products and contact lenses that offer UV protection.

• Avoid direct sun exposure as much as possible during peak UV radiation hours (between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.)

• Perform skin self-exams regularly to become familiar with existing growths and notice any changes or new growths.

• Eighty percent of a person's lifetime sun exposure is acquired before the age of 18. As a parent, be a good role model and foster skin cancer prevention habits in your child.

By following these guidelines, you and your family can protect "the skin you're in!"

Keep Your Home Safe While On Vacation! More than half of the US

population will take a vacation away from home this summer. According to FBI statistics, there is a 10-18 percent increase in home burglaries during the summer months. According to the Insurance Information Institute, 9 out of 10 home break-ins could be prevented with some simple steps. **The following are a few "Do's & Don'ts" to keep your home safe while you travel:**

• **DO** make sure all doors & windows are locked and fastened.

• **DO** examine your house from the street and make sure no valuables (electronics/art) are visible.

• **DO** secure sliding glass doors by placing a metal rod or a piece of plywood in the track to prevent intruders.

• **DO** unplug the power to your garage door opener to keep thieves from opening it with a universal remote.

• **DO** make it appear that you're home by use of timers, radios & TV's.

• **DO** consider installing a home security system & make sure it's activated upon leaving. Studies have shown that homes without working security systems are 300% more likely to experience a theft.

• **DON'T** post your vacation on social networking sites.

• **DON'T** leave clues that you're away. Have a neighbor collect your newspapers & mail.

• **DON'T** close blinds if you usually keep them open. The more normal your home looks, the better.

• **DON'T** leave a portable GPS in your car when parked in lots. It'll alert thieves that you're not home and give them a convenient map to your house. Prior to vacationing, drop by the Police Department and fill out a "Property Check Request" form. **REMEMBER – IF YOU SEE**

Summer Safety



With summer approaching remember these precautionary tips to keep yourself and your family safe: **Distracted Driving** – Too many people are killed and injured each year by distracted drivers. Talking on a handheld cell phone quadruples your risk of an accident (and is illegal in New York). That risk doubles if you're texting.

Dangers of Extreme Heat – Heat illnesses can be deadly. In extreme heat situations, your body's temperature control system can't keep up. When this happens, your body temperature gets dangerously high. As a result, you're at greater risk of serious heat illness, such as heat stroke, heat exhaustion, heat cramps and sunburn. How to Protect Yourself: ***STAY COOL** – Stay inside, in airconditioning if you can, or in a cool place such as basements. Wear lightweight, light-colored, loose-fitting clothing.

***STAY HYDRATED** – Drink more water than usual, especially if exercising or outdoors. Be proactive, don't wait until you're thirsty.

* NEVER LEAVE CHILDREN, OR PETS IN A PARKED VEHICLE – Just don't do it. The sun can turn a vehicle into an oven within minutes, even if it doesn't feel that hot outside.

*HELP YOUR PETS KEEP THEIR COOL – It will feel as hot for them as it is for you. Be sure your animals have access to shade and a water bowl full of clean, cold water. Dogs don't tolerate heat well because they don't sweat. During summer heat, avoid outdoor games or jogging with your pet. If you wouldn't walk across hot asphalt barefoot, don't make your dog walk on it either. (Dogs can get blisters on their paws from hot pavement.) Please remember the Phoenix Police Department is always here for you. Have a fun and safe summer and stay cool!

Hydrant Flushing August 22 -August 26

The DPW has planned out a busy summer this year including sidewalk replacement, road repairs and some drainage work along with the routine pick up of yard waste and brush. We also try to keep up on maintaining Village buildings and parks. Brush pick up is normally on Fridays. Stack brush neatly with cut ends to the road. Normally yard waste is picked up 2-3 times a week. All grass clippings and light debris must be packed in biodegradable paper bags. No dirt or stones in bags. Pile dirt and heavy wastes separately. We do not pick up lumber or construction debris. That must be taken to a landfill. Please check in with our Village Facebook page to see notices if we have any water and sewer issues. We try to post
